## CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FULLY FUNDED

### Supporters step up to meet Mabee Challenge Grant

Ozarks Food Harvest donors helped us meet a \$700,000 J.E. & L.E. Mabee Foundation Challenge Grant. These funds will go toward building our 56,000-foot expansion.

The walls are already going up, and a grand opening of the new warehouse space will take place this summer.

That will mean more room to accept, process and store food donations, more fresh food in our dedicated produce cooler, more freezer space, more space for volunteer projects ... and, most importantly, more hungry Ozarks families fed.

For nearly 35 years, Ozarks Food Harvest

has had a mission of *Transforming Hunger into Hope*. The Food Bank provides food and supplies to 270 nonprofit hunger-relief organizations across southwest Missouri. Currently, Ozarks Food Harvest provides 16.8 million meals to more than 261,000 unduplicated individuals annually.

But that leaves a meal gap of 15 million more meals needed by food insecure individuals in our 28 counties to improve food security.

We will take a giant step toward closing that gap when we no longer have to turn away a million pounds of food a year because of lack of space, leaving children, families and seniors without needed food.

A lead gift from the O'Reilly family, all of our

generous donors and the Mabee Foundation Challenge Grant made it possible to meet the \$4.6 million goal to build, furnish and operate the new expansion.

Thanks to our four star rating from Charity Navigator, donors know that the money they give is being used to support our mission.

That mission is to reach all of the children, families and seniors who face the reality of not knowing where or when their next meal is coming. Michelle and her children are one of those families.

Michelle is a single mother of two teenagers. She is disabled and recently broke her hip, making it even more difficult to get around.

"I've been having a rough week," she told us. "My kids are going to their dad's, but their dad does not have any money for groceries. I was worried about how I was going to afford to get groceries to send them with."

Michelle was able to get assistance from Ozarks Food Harvest.

"[Now I have] some groceries to send with my kids when they visit their dad. It takes a big stress off," she said.

Michelle has also been struggling with high utility bills, but she is still very thankful for the support from Ozarks Food Harvest.

"It came on a day that I was stressing out

and needed it," she said. "It was so great to get that. It took the weight off my shoulders. ... We really appreciate it."

Thanks to all our Capital Campaign donors, when our new expansion is completed, we will have the ability to help more families like Michelle's across our service area. We will be another step closer to closing the meal gap and *Transforming Hunger into Hope*. ■

## CANS FOR COFFEE RESULTS

For the past 10 years, McDonald's restaurants across southwest Missouri have partnered with Ozarks Food Harvest in its fight to end hunger across the Ozarks through McDonald's Cans for Coffee program.

This year, 25,280 pounds of food was donated by customers at more than 65 local McDonald's restaurants during the month-long event in November. Customers donated at least one nonperishable food item in exchange for a free small McCafé beverage.

All those lattes, hot chocolates, cappuccinos, macchiatos and cups of coffee have translated into extra food for Ozarks Food Harvest to distribute across its network of 270 food pantries and hunger-relief programs in 28 counties.

The partnership also resulted in a truckload of Tyson chicken donated to The Food Bank, to help provide much-needed protein to the families who access help through those pantries and programs.

Since the Cans for Coffee program started in 2008, McDonald's of the Ozarks has collected more than 257,000 pounds of food — 230,000 meals — from community members. This long-standing partnership is very important to Ozarks Food Harvest. It not only brings in needed donations, it builds awareness of the growing issues of hunger in our area.

"This promotion with local McDonald's stores has provided hundreds of thousands of much-needed meals over the past ten years," said Denise Gibson, development and communication director at Ozarks Food Harvest. "We're grateful for the store operators and customers who participate each year to help their neighbors in need." ■

## SCOUTING FOR FOOD BEGINS NEXT MONTH

### 29th annual food drive provides good training for Boy Scouts

Area Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts are true Hunger Heroes. For the past 29 years, the Scouts have been collecting food during their Scouting for Food drive, and this year they will do it again.

Scouts and their leaders go door to door in local neighborhoods to accept food donations throughout the month of March, with a wrap-up event on March 31 at local retail stores. The food is delivered to Ozarks Food Harvest or directly to partner food pantries in smaller communities.

Last year, the Scouts collected more than 38,000 pounds of food — 32,000 meals in all — during the drive. Kurtis Grothoff, an Ozark Trails Council district executive who coordinated last year's Scouting for Food, said the collection "crushed" previous records.

"We're so proud of the area Boy Scouts and their record collections during this year's Scouting for Food," said Bart Brown, president and CEO of Ozarks Food Harvest.

"Scouting has a long-standing mission of giving back to the community, and we look forward to this project each year because it creates an immediate impact in the lives of

our neighbors here at home," said John Feick, CEO of the Ozark Trails Council.

The Ozark Trails Council serves 7,500 youth members across southwest Missouri and southeast Kansas. It is the mission of the Boy Scouts of America to prepare young people to make moral and ethical choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and the Scout Law.

The Scouting for Food drive is part of that mission by providing a great way to engage young people in Ozarks Food Harvest's mission of *Transforming Hunger into Hope* and encourage them to think of others. ■

# POVERTY STILL A RED FLAG, EXPANSION WILL HELP

Greetings from the O'Reilly Center for Hunger Relief!

This year will bring some amazing possibilities to Ozarks Food Harvest. That's because our generous supporters have stepped up to meet the challenge to expand our facility and our reach to end hunger in the Ozarks.

More than two years ago, The Food Bank began its capital campaign to raise \$4.6 million for a 56,000-square-foot expansion to allow room to accept more food donations, especially fresh produce, in order to reach more people in need.

Being awarded the Mabee Challenge Grant was a giant step toward success in our Capital Campaign, and our faithful supporters


have made that success a reality. The Mabee Challenge Grant allowed us to raise the majority of funds needed for the expansion. We've already broken ground and begun construction, which is expected to open this summer.

But the real success will be when we are able to feed more families in need in our 28-county service area. There is no question that the need has outpaced our ability to meet it, but this expansion will change that.

When the Community Report Card, a look at the challenges and successes in our area, was released last year, poverty was again one of the Red Flags, a continuing need that is keeping our community from succeeding. That conclusion was further supported by a recent Feeding America study, Map the Meal Gap, which found the food insecurity rate in our service area is at 15.3 percent. That is one in seven adults and one in five children who face uncertainty finding their next meal.

We have experienced this reality up close at Ozarks Food Harvest. Since the Great Recession, we have seen the number of clients seeking food assistance grow from 53,000 individuals in 2007 to 155,000 in 2009, and currently 261,000 annually.

Many of those people are forced to purchase inexpensive, unhealthy food to make ends meet, and must still depend on local food pantries to supplement their pantries at home. They would love to feed their families fresh fruits and vegetables,



protein and dairy products, but many simply can't afford it.

Joshua and his sister, Lorali, are examples of the growing need in the Ozarks. Joshua, age 8, and Lorali, age 7, live with their mom and dad in a hotel room in Springfield as the family struggles to get back on its economic feet. The children both participate in the *Weekend Backpack Program*, which provides kids with six meals to take home each weekend.

"It feels good to take food home from school, because it helps us," says Joshua. "Sometimes we have food and sometimes we don't."

We know that our *Weekend Backpack Program* and the support for local food pantries are making life a little easier for Joshua and Lorali's family and others. Now, this expansion will mean that they will not only be assured that there will be food on the table, but more of it will be fresh, healthy food.

Thanks to our generous Capital Campaign donors, Ozarks Food Harvest keeps on growing.

These Hunger Heroes helped us raise the money for a 56,000-square-foot expansion that will allow us to accept more donations and respond to more need.

We have been growing steadily since we began, especially since we moved into our current location in 2009. That year, we were distributing 7 million pounds of food. In 2017, we distributed a record-breaking 17 million pounds — or 15 million meals — to hungry families right here in the Ozarks.

Our current facility has allowed us to play a key role in helping people who experienced financial strain in the 2008 Great Recession, many of whom may have never faced food insecurity and were unsure where to seek

assistance.

And, in 2011, our expanded facility also allowed us to play a key role in providing food when the Joplin tornado hit. We could immediately engage our partner agencies to distribute and prepare meals for people hit by the devastation.

The expansion will position us to step up when future disasters strike.

But, most importantly, having adequate space and appropriate storage will allow us to respond to the daily disaster of hunger.

And that goes on year-round. It's a daily disaster for nearly a quarter million people in our service area.

What we've been able to do is not only meet the needs for some very specific tragedies of increased need, but we've been able to really narrow the hunger gap in terms of how many people are going without fresh, healthy food.

It's about using every resource that we have to meet this daily need that's not going away.

Chris is a 23-year-old in West Plains with a family to feed. His experience is an example of the daily disaster of hunger and of how important it is that we have fresh, healthy food available.

"We have two young children," Chris said. "They love the fresh fruits and veggies. Produce is hard to find in West Plains."

He explained that too often he and his





wife, Abera, purchase fresh produce only to discover that some of it is inedible because of mold and rot.

"We value the natural food," Chris says. "It is disappointing when we do not have access to them ... We are just trying to get by. There are not enough job resources in West Plains. There are a lot of minimum wage jobs, which do not provide enough for our family to live on."

One of the reasons we need the additional space provided by our expansion is that so many folks, like Chris, work but rely on food pantries to meet their budget.

Thanks to all our supporters, we can meet the need!

## VOLUNTEERS BUILD WATER CATCHMENT

The Ozarks Food Harvest Garden grows fresh produce year-round, in raised beds and high tunnels. Now, thanks to a new water catchment system, veggies can get water even in the dry season.

Alexa Poindexter, Full Circle Gardens Coordinator, explained that the system not only provides needed water, it eliminates too much water. One of the two high tunnels experienced flooding because the tunnel sheds water — an inch of rain will produce about 900 gallons of water — that was not draining away. Instead, it created a soggy mess.

The Iowa State University Extension completed a pilot project that captured water from high tunnels and used it for irrigation. The extension office created a toolkit so others could copy the system, and OFH took on the challenge.

The system includes guttering that drains water into a 1,250-gallon underground tank. That tank will provide needed water for a 30- by 30-foot garden plot that grew watermelons last year and will produce sweet potatoes this year.

Several other major partners have helped make the project possible, including Baker Creek Heirloom Seeds, Light Up Springfield, University of Missouri Extension, James River Basin Partnership, Watts Radiant, Cummins Pool and Excavating, Westlake Ace Hardware in Springfield, Gold Mechanical, Curtis Claybaker, and Bob & Barb Hutson, as well as many other wonderful volunteers.

Dudenhoeffer also cherishes the friendships she has made during her time volunteering. "The camaraderie of like-minded people [with] the same common goal is what keeps me going. I have formed so many friendships here and the volunteer coaches are just so good."

Her experience with The Food Bank has inspired Dudenhoeffer to show her kids the importance of giving their time back to the community. She loves to take her younger kids to the Ozarks Food Harvest Garden and her oldest daughter to Hungerthon to volunteer.

"Now my children always want to give back to Ozarks Food Harvest because it has opened their eyes to what is really going on in our community."
